FROM THE PRINCIPAL



*Dear Parents, Guardians, Alumni,
and Supporters of St. Mary
Interparochial School,*

The 2019-2020 academic school year has been like no other. The COVID-19 pandemic has produced a high level of uncertainty and stress within our communities. By now, we have all been impacted by this virus, which has been devastating for so many. Despite all of the challenges we have faced and are still facing today, this pandemic has brought out the best in many people. We are so proud of the resiliency, adaptability, creativity, patience, and dedication of our faculty, staff, students, and families at St. Mary Interparochial School, and, even with the closure of our physical school building, we still have a lot to celebrate.

This past year, we provided weekly “STREAM” (Science, Technology, Religion, Engineering, Arts and Math) programming which replaced our current technology curriculum. This curriculum shift is the result of current research which suggests that in order to prepare students for the 21st Century future workforce, students need to be complex problem-solvers, critical-thinkers, and creative, empathetic and collaborative team members. Through this refocused K-8 STREAM curriculum, students are developing the skills needed to be successful through hands-on, project-based, design thinking, that emphasizes STEAM learning with the added Religious approach. Through a generous two-year grant from the Ambassador’s Fund for Education (formerly known as the Archdiocesan Educational Fund), our STREAM mobile makerspaces and nutritional programming, through Greener Partners, were used to support this shift in learning.

St. Mary Interparochial School was also a proud partner of the Global Philadelphia Association, in celebration of Philadelphia being designated as the first World Heritage City in the United States of America. As the schoolwide theme for this year, students reflected on their family heritage, their Philadelphia heritage, and their Catholic and religious heritage.

In March, as concerns grew locally about the uncertainty of COVID-19, we informed families that we would meet as a staff to prepare auxiliary plans in light of a possible closure. This announcement also included a remote learning survey to better understand our families’ at-home resources for learning. A preemptive planning meeting was held before COVID-19 was officially declared a global pandemic and before stay at home orders were put in place. Because of this meeting, when the school community was informed that Governor Wolf had announced all Pennsylvania schools were officially closed for in-person instruction, our teachers and students seamlessly transitioned to remote/virtual learning. Remote/virtual learning was not easy, but we adapted. We learned new skills. We learned platforms. We were flexible to the changes needed to be made, and we were still creative and innovative. This is why our staff, our students, and our families are so special; that even with all of the challenges a pandemic may bring, you are still shining your St. Mary light through it all.

Although we were virtual for four months, our students still participated in many unique virtual clubs and competitions. Several of our middle school students participated and placed in the Philadelphia Carver Science Fair competition, the Delaware Valley Science Fair competition and the National History Day competition. Several of our 6th Grade students virtually participated in the Philadelphia Model UN Competition and placed. Our Mathcounts group competed in the Math Video Challenge and was spotlighted as a Gold Level Project. And from the pandemic, Sign Language Club, Guided Meditation and BreakoutEDU Live club was created.

As we close the chapter on the 2019-2020 school year, we know that this was a difficult year for many, but most especially for the graduating class of 2020. We were so happy to be able to celebrate you and we will always be proud of you. We wish you the best of luck in your respective high schools.

Looking forward to the 2020-2021 school year, we have many wonderful improvements to share with you. Through the generosity of our St. Mary donors, and with the help of our hard working advancement team, we are excited to improve the physical space here at St. Mary for our students. The classrooms and hallways in first through fourth grade received new flooring, and the hallways in both the lower school and middle school have been repainted. In addition to this, our Home and School Association provided the school with nearly \$10,000 in cleaning equipment to help maintain both the daily and deep cleanings needed within the building.

We are also very excited to announce that we are partnering with Thomas Jefferson University in a two year initiative to strengthen our students’ understanding and view of health and healing. Together, we will be aiming to redefine and provide relevant education of healing through mental, physical and spiritual growth. This initiative will bring long term health practices into our community’s mainstream living. In conjunction with this health initiative, students will also participate in a Roots2Rise project. This organization will provide Yoga mats and guide participants on the principles of patience, awareness, focus and daily ease.

Whether we are learning in-person, hybrid, or fully virtual, with your support, we are able to continue to offer a quality Catholic education to families from various parishes and zip codes while remaining a crown jewel in the historic heart of Philadelphia. It is our sincere hope that you will continue to share your time, talent, and treasure with our children. My most sincere thanks to you for your investment in Saint Mary Interparochial School and the Christ-centered leaders you are helping to shape for today and tomorrow!

MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD OF LIMITED JURISDICTION



None of us, if transported back to one year ago, envisioned a world upended by the effects of a global pandemic. And yet here we are, four months into the Covid-19 pandemic and counting,

and on the verge of opening the 2020-2021 school year. The challenges presented by the Covid-19 pandemic have been immense, but thanks to the collaborative efforts of the school administration, faculty, parents, and students, St. Mary's has been able to continue to provide a Blue Ribbon education in an environment designed to protect the health and welfare of the school community. As we embark on the upcoming school year, parents will have the option of choosing a full virtual learning experience or a "Hybrid" model, incorporating live attendance and virtual learning.

St. Mary's was at the forefront of virtual learning when the pandemic first affected the region in March 2020, and St. Mary's ability to provide its award-winning educational experience in the context of virtual learning allowed us to finish the 2019-2020 school year successfully and on schedule. Virtual learning, along with in-person classes, will be continued to be used in

the 2020-2021 school year. Every effort will be made to protect the health and welfare of the students and faculty. Thanks to the efforts of the Home and School Association, the school purchased nearly \$9,000 in cleaning and sanitation equipment. The school will undergo extensive daily cleaning and additional "deep" cleaning on Wednesdays and Saturdays (electrostatic sprayers will be used throughout the building using Bioesque Botanical Disinfectant Solution and Septin/420 on all hard surfaces, when the building is empty). The grades will be split into "cohorts" encompassing two grades each (kindergarten will be its own cohort) to ensure limited potential interaction with other classes. Ultraboard Barrier Micro, a plexiglass-like material, will be installed at each student's desk. Teachers will wear face shields (in the classroom) and face shields and masks (outside of the classroom). Masks and social distancing will be monitored throughout the school, as well, all to ensure that every step is being taken to protect the well-being of the students and faculty.

The Board will be working with the administration to assist in providing the support needed for a successful and safe school year. Accordingly, we invite you to attend the Open Board meeting on October 6, 2020. Now, more than ever, the Board

welcomes the opportunity to hear from the school community as we work to overcome the challenges of the upcoming school year.

We will eventually see brighter days and long-awaited normalcy will return to St. Mary's. Until then, however, we on the Board are fully confident that the school will provide another rewarding school year for the students, in a safe and healthy environment. Thank you for your support, sacrifice, and cooperation.

18TH ANNUAL WALKATHON: Supporting Art, Music, Language, and Culture Education for our Children









History of Saint Mary Interparochial School

The rich academic and historic heritage of St. Mary Interparochial School dates to the early days of Philadelphia, as Catholics and Protestants engaged in a spirited debate over educational practices. Founded in 1782 by the Jesuit fathers of Old St. Joseph's Church, St. Mary is known as "The Mother School" of Catholic parochial education and is credited with influencing Catholic educational patterns in this country. Situated near Independence Hall and other pivotal sites in old Philadelphia, it served children for more than a century before closing in 1902 after a devastating fire. St. Mary's reopened in 1968, again with a distinction: With students drawn from six different parishes, it was the first interparochial school in the nation. St. Mary Interparochial School is situated in Independence National Park and serves over 250 children from all over the City of Philadelphia and its suburbs.
